

The Play

Written in 1958, *The Dumb Waiter* is one of Pinter's earliest plays. Even then, Pinter was an expert at mixing the realistic with the absurd, the personal with the political. When the play opens, two men, Ben and Gus, are waiting in a windowless basement room. They are awaiting instructions for their next assignment. While they wait, their conversation is riddled with conflict and miscommunication. Differences between the two men's attitudes emerge, yet questions remain. Pinter said of his dramas, "Between my lack of biographical data about (the characters) and the ambiguity of what they say lies a territory which is not only worthy of exploration, but which it is compulsory to explore."

Harry Derbyshire wrote of the play, "Small but perfectly formed, *The Dumb Waiter* might be considered the best of Harold Pinter's plays... It combines the classic characteristics of early Pinter—a paucity of information and an atmosphere of menace, working-class small-talk in a claustrophobic setting—with an oblique but palpable political edge and, in so doing, can be seen as containing the germ of Pinter's entire dramatic oeuvre."

The Playwright

Harold Pinter (1930—2008) is considered to be one of the most influential modern British dramatists. His career spanned more than 50 years as a playwright, screenwriter, director, and actor. He was awarded the Nobel Prize for Literature in 2005. In the announcement, the committee wrote that "his plays uncover the precipice under everyday prattle and forces entry into oppression's closed rooms." His plays emphasized that the unflinching, unswerving, fierce intellectual determination to define the real truth of our lives and our societies is a crucial obligation which devolves upon us all.

Discussion, Questions, and Answers

After a brief intermission, we invite everyone to join the cast and director for a meaningful conversation about the themes of the play and how they transcend the boundaries of the stage. We are all struggling with pressing issues of environmental challenges, social inequalities, racism, and politics. Many, if not most, of us struggle with a sense of powerlessness as individuals to make any difference. Our hope is that everyone will leave the theatre tonight with inspiration to take action together through personal choices, community initiatives, and broader advocacy efforts.
